# Can we double **ABC survival by 2025?**

The release of I'm still here, our landmark report on advanced breast cancer (ABC) in New Zealand, has kick-started action aimed at doubling survival for Kiwis with ABC. With your help, we'll be pushing politicians, doctors and public servants to do everything possible to reach this goal. We're inspired by the words of Dr Fatima Cardoso, world expert on ABC:

**Breast Cancer** 

"Every country must analyse where things are not going so well, and where things can be improved." To double survival, you cannot just go for one strategy; there must be a combination of strategies."

*I'm still here* released. It reveals Kiwis are dying of ABC twice as fast as people in comparable countries. Average survival for a Kiwi with ABC is just 16 months, compared with two to three years, or more, in countries like Australia, Germany and France. Once diagnosed with ABC, Kiwis seem to receive less treatment than in comparable countries, and up to one-quarter receive none at all. Half of ABC patients receive no chemotherapy – and those that do are often pushed to the back of the queue. We call for an urgent change in attitude that sets expectations higher for people with ABC in New Zealand.

#### October 2, 2018

Health Minister Dr David Clark meets with oncologists at Breast Cancer Foundation NZ (BCFNZ) office, prompted by release of report.

#### October 4, 2018

BCFNZ announces new Clinical Trials Fellow at Auckland City Hospital. Dr Edmond Ang will help get clinical trials up and running, many of which will involve ABC patients.

#### October 16, 2018

Breast Cancer Foundation NZ's chief executive Evangelia Henderson joins petitioners on the steps of Parliament, demanding funding for life-extending drugs palbociclib and Kadcyla. She describes the lack of funding for drugs that extend lives of ABC patients as heartless and cruel.

#### **November 2018**

I'm still here identified inability to manage pain as the #1 negative impact on patients' lives. In response, BCFNZ starts proof-of-concept work for innovative pilot, looking at whether the physical and emotional side-effects of ABC - including anxiety (fear), fatigue and pain - can be helped with virtual reality.

### Patients to receive more support than ever before

Thanks to our generous donors, BCFNZ has been able to boost our nursing and support services – and we're continuing to expand what's being offered to patients across New Zealand.

Recent additions to our breast nurse team are Auckland-based Natalie James (nurse lead and support services manager), Kathryn Terry and Catriona Farac, and Wellington-based Melissa Warren.

Callers to our free 0800 BC NURSE helpline receive expert advice from the team. Whether they are concerned about a symptom, have a question about genetics, or need support during or after surgery, they are given all the information they need to take the next steps.

Meanwhile, our online community, mybc, continues to grow. Patients receive support, tips and advice from our nurses as well as other women going through a similar journey.

Hundreds of people have received free physio for rehab following breast surgery, group exercise sessions and counselling. We have also introduced funding for lymphoedema treatment (see Dear Nurse to find out more.)

We plan on continuing to grow our nurse team in our Auckland office as well as around New Zealand







# **ABC survival by 2025? - Continued**



#### January 2019

BCFNZ brings Dr Fatima Cardoso, a world authority on ABC, to New Zealand. She gives a patient seminar in Auckland, a public lecture in Wellington, and speaks at the Cancer Care at a Crossroads conference for healthcare professionals. She also meets with breast cancer specialists and Ministry of Health officials and is interviewed by major media.

#### February 2019

As part of CANGO (an alliance of major cancer non-government organisations) BCFNZ calls on the government to develop a Rapid Access Scheme for new cancer medicines and treatments

#### February 2019

BCFNZ launches a petition asking for free GP visits for ABC patients. Nearly 2,000 people sign it in the first fortnight.

#### **March 2019**

BCFNZ pushes for establishment of local guidelines for standards of care. Guidelines are proven to improve survival.

#### March 13, 2019

ABC patients present their moving stories to the Health Select Committee, demanding funding for palbociclib and Kadcyla and an overhaul of our drug-funding agency, Pharmac.

#### March, 2019

Dr Fatima Cardoso is invited to make a submission to the Health Select Committee regarding funding for palbociclib and Kadcyla.

#### NEWSFLASH: April 11, 2019

New Zealand's Prime Minister, Jacinda Adern, asks Health Minister Dr David Clark to look into the issue of early access to new drugs.

**The Breast Cancer Foundation National Register was** instrumental in providing data needed for I'm still here.


