It's the second year in a row that BCFNZ has organised the breast nurse conference. Last year it was held in Auckland, and feedback was very positive.

Scalp cooling comes to Rotorua

Breast cancer patients at Rotorua Hospital will have access to scalp cooling during chemotherapy treatment thanks to our generous supporters. Rotorua is the first public hospital to receive a scalp cooling system donated by Breast Cancer Foundation NZ (BCFNZ) following our successful pilot in Nelson.

BCFNZ's chief executive Evangelia Henderson says, "Smaller regional areas like Rotorua sometimes miss out on health funding, so we are thrilled to be able to provide this opportunity to patients."

Dr Prashanth Hari Dass, a medical oncologist based in Rotorua Hospital, says this is positive for women in his area. "Thank you for giving Rotorua this opportunity." Dr Hari Dass says breast cancer patients from Taupo, Turangi, Mangakino and Murupara will also benefit.

Scalp cooling systems minimise hair loss during breast cancer chemotherapy, and can make a hugely positive difference to women as they go through treatment.

BCFNZ funded a successful pilot in Nelson Hospital last year. Of the patients that completed treatment, none lost more than 50% of their hair, and some had as little as 10% hair loss. None of the patients needed a wig.

Mrs Henderson says she is delighted that generous Kiwi donors have made the roll-out possible. "This kind of service makes an enormous difference to some patients, yet it is unlikely to ever be a priority for government spending," she says.

"We are talking to several District Health Boards across New Zealand right now. We hope as many as possible will jump at the chance to offer scalp cooling to their patients, and we look forward to receiving their applications.

"Breast cancer treatment can be harrowing," she says. "These systems will reduce suffering by helping women keep most of their hair."

Scalp cooling is widely used throughout the UK, and more than 120 machines have been installed in Australian hospitals in the last few years.

Fundraiser extraordinaire

Cathie Martin has lost family and friends to breast cancer and had a scare herself when she was 38. Fortunately, the lump was removed with no further treatment needed.

Cathie has fundraised for BCFNZ for several years. She trekked the Great Wall of China in 2015 and met many wonderful women on that trip, many of them breast cancer survivors.

Her second trek was the El Camino pilgrim trail in Spain. Sadly, the day she was leaving Madrid to start the trek, her mother passed away. "It was certainly a beautiful trek and I had Mum with me all the way."

Cathie is now training for the Cambodia bike ride. "My bike riding is great, although it had been 25 years since I did any!" Cathie's fundraising has included a family music day, movie night, morning tea, house concert, selling soaps and raffle tickets.

Cathie, 65, has three children and seven grandchildren. She and her husband, Graeme, own a civil construction business. Cathie does administration but also drives trucks. Cathie, you are amazing!

Cold caps and scalp cooling systems are tightly fitting, strap-on, helmet-type hats filled with a special refrigerated gel coolant.

They work by narrowing the blood vessels beneath the skin of the scalp, reducing the amount of chemotherapy medicine that reaches the hair follicles.

With less chemotherapy medicine in the follicles, the hair may be less likely to fall out.



Katja Rummel was the first patient to use scalp cooling technology in Nelson Hospital in a pilot funded by Breast Cancer Foundation NZ. She underwent a double mastectomy and delayed having chemotherapy as she was concerned about the side-effects, including hair loss.

"My long, thick, curly, brown hair means a lot to me. The thought of losing it and having to walk around bald-headed was very uncomfortable."

She was also concerned about how her young daughter, Amiria, would react. "I heard from other mums whose children were frightened by their hair loss." When she heard about the scalp cooling pilot, she was happy to proceed with treatment.

"I am so happy that there is the option of this hair cooling system for all the others who have to go through this. In my opinion, it makes a huge difference. It is such a hard journey emotionally, so if you can keep your hair that's such a bonus," Katia said.

Nelson breast cancer patients have continued to be offered scalp cooling since the study was completed.

Question: Can I have a mammogram before I'm 45?

Answer: Yes!

Although the free, two-yearly BreastScreen Aotearoa screening program is for women aged 45-69, you CAN have a mammogram outside this age bracket. In fact, we recommend you consider starting your mammograms from the age of 40. You can pay to do this privately at a radiology clinic. Or, if you have symptoms (a lump, for example), speak to your GP for a referral into the public system.

If you're concerned about inherited breast cancer risk, speak to your GP and they can create a suitable plan for you or refer you to Genetic Health Service.

Pink Caravan goes the distance for breast education

Our iconic Pink Caravan travelled across Auckland, Waikato and Bay of Plenty in the first half of this year before taking a well-earned rest over winter.

Our on-board nurses had 2,000 in-depth conversations and education sessions with people in smaller communities and workplaces.

BCFNZ lead nurse Natalie James says the most satisfying aspect of the caravan's work is its deep engagement with harder-to-reach people. "Our nurses bring the breast health message to communities in a warm, non-threatening way. People leave the caravan feeling empowered about their own health.

"We were delighted to be able to sign up 134 women to the free mammogram programme," she says. "These are women who, for different reasons, have been unable to take part in screening, but with the support of our nurses felt confident to register with the programme. That's a great result."
